Student

Graduate students with a B.A. in history and send them on to graduate and post-baccalaureate studies or lucrative employment.

Increase number of history majors and history minors (and keep better track of the minors). Improve the program website for better communication and access to forms and other resources for students.

Program

Develop M.A. graduate program long form for CSUCI, CSU, and WASC approval. Development of a History-Social Science Subject Matter Waiver emphasis within the history major, which involves getting a proposal through CSU and CCTC oversight committees. Involves coordination with other social science programs (Chicana/o Studies, Political Science, Anthropology, Economics).

Hire additional full-time tenure-track faculty to broaden expertise in World History, especially of South, Southeast and Central Asia, the Mediterranean, North Africa and the Middle East.

Development of program by-laws.

Continue bringing notable historians as speakers to campus.

Continue developing History Advisory Board, with membership drawn from Ventura County Museums (many of which host our internship students), Community College History Department Chairs and faculty, and middle and high school history teachers, to foster community ties for faculty and students.

Review and formalize existing student internship community partnerships and develop new ones.
